**Comments:** From 26 October 2020 to 30 October 2020, the Ekurhuleni Metropolitan Municipality had a functional website with a dedicated page for procurement information under the main tab titled 'For my Business'. This particular tab has a dedicated page for tender-related information accessible without registration. For example, under the 'Tenders' tab the public have access to Open

Tenders (over R200 000), information relating 'Tender Awards', a register of all the bidders (Tender Opening Register), an explanation of the open tender process and finally a tab dealing with Notice to Bidders. Note, the Notice to Bidders comprises of generally notices informing bidders of the cancellation of tenders.

## 2. Does the municipality publish tender notices?

- a. Yes, the municipality publishes tender notices and the list of tender notices seems complete.
- b. Yes, the municipality publishes tender notices but the list of tender notices has obvious gaps or the list seems incomplete.
- c. No, there are no tender notices on the municipality's website.

**Comments:** Under the 'Open Tender tab', the municipality published tender notices. However, tender notices only for certain months namely, June, August, and September 2020 were available. Thus, the list of tender notices upon review had obvious gaps and seemed incomplete since for the period under review (1 September 2019 – 31 August 2020), no tender notices dating back to 1 September 2019 was accessible on the municipality's website, as from 27 October 2020.

- 3. Does the municipality publish tender specifications for tender notices on its website, can they be downloaded free of charge?
  - a. Yes, the municipality publishes tender specifications on its website, which are downloadable free of charge.
  - b. Yes, the municipality publishes tender specifications, which are downloadable free of charge but only for some tender notices or the municipality publishes tender specifications but it imposes a cost to access the specifications.
  - c. No, the municipality does not publish tender specifications.

- 4. Does the municipality publish the name of companies or individuals who win tenders on its website? Does it do so on time (i.e. within five working days after the award)?
  - a. Yes, the municipality publishes information about who wins tenders within five working days.

- b. Yes, the municipality publishes information about who wins tenders but after five working days or the list of names of companies or individuals who won the tender has obvious gaps or seems incomplete.
- c. No, the municipality does not publish information about who wins tenders.

**Comments:** The Municipality's webpage has a tab for 'Tenders awarded', and as of 27 October 2020, information about who won the tenders was only published on the municipality's website after 5 working days. See for example, the bids awarded in July 2020, only appeared on the municipality's website 11 August 2020 (The date when the file was created). Tender awards were not published individually on the municipality's website, but published monthly, collectively.

- 5. Do tender specifications remain accessible on the website after the contract has been awarded for the duration of the contract?
  - a. Yes, the tender specifications remain accessible on the website after the contract has been awarded for the duration of the contract.
  - b. Yes, the tender specifications remain accessible on the website after the contract has been awarded but not for the entire duration of the contract or not all tender specification information remains accessible on the website for the entire duration of the relevant contracts.
  - c. No, the tender specifications are removed after the award of the contract or the municipality does not publish tender specifications.

For example, a tender awarded in August and September 2020, (A-WS-02 2020) - Appointment of Contractors for the upgrading, refurbishment and decommissioning of water and sewer pump station specifications no longer appeared on the municipality's website.   - b. Yes, the municipality publishes information on how the project will be implemented, but the list of service delivery agreement or implementation plans has obvious gaps or the list seems incomplete.

c. No, the municipality does not publish information on how the project will be implemented.

	General	assessment:
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a) What is your overall impression on how easy it is to navigate the municipal website to find procurement information? The Municipality's website is fairly easy to navigate, especially with all procurement information accessible under one tab 'Tenders'. I would score the municipality 6/10.

b) Any tips on how the municipality could improve citizens' access to procurement information on its website?

There are a number of ways in which the municipality could improve access to procurement information. For example, the municipality could make available all bid specifications for awarded tenders. In other words, apart from releasing a list of successful bidders, the municipality must make accessible all bid specifications and service delivery agreements. This information must be accessible under one folder.

c) Are there any best practices in the municipality which can be shared with other municipalities?

None.

d) Are there any other issues that caught your attention when undertaking the assessment? On the publication of successful bidders, it is interesting to note that the municipality did not publish who won a particular tender within five working days after the award of the tender. On the contrary, the municipality released monthly reports for successful bidders.

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
